## ATLAS OF THE ELAPID SNAKES OF AUSTRALIA

The Bureau of Flora and Fauna has prepared the most informative account of the distribution of Australia's elapid snakes in the **Atlas of the Elapid Snakes of Australia**. The **Atlas** contains a distribution map for each of the seventy-seven species of venomous (elapid) snakes found in Australia, and for the first time locality data from all the major Australian and overseas institutions housing large collections of elapid snakes have been assembled together. This has resulted in the production of one of the largest documented records of an Australian animal group, with over 17 000 authenticated records.

Atlas of the Elapid Snakes of Australia features the potential distribution of each species determined by using a bioclimatic model and contains several essays by noted Australian scientists.

Atlas of the Elapid Snakes of Australia is a beautifully presented publication featuring many colour photographs and detailed distribution maps.

It is spiral-bound for easy use in the field and will be a valuable resource for those with an interest in Australia's unique elapid snakes.
